FOCUS ON LITERACY AND NUMERACY

An increasingly important aspect of teachers' work is analysing student data including NAPLAN (Years 7 and 9), Best Start (Year 7), Check In (Year 8) and RAP (Year 12). The Department's aim is to provide teachers with accurate, diagnostic information about each student so that learning can be personalised and students experiencing difficulties or who are not achieving expected growth can receive additional academic support. At the start of the the school's Literacy and Numeracy team assisted staff to take a deep dive into our data and review teaching and learning programs. I would like to acknowledge the expertise of this team led by Jack Taylor (Head Teacher English) and thank them for their work in the lead up to this event.

P&C MATTERS

This year we have had renewed interest from parents and carers keen to become involved in the school's P&C organisation. This group plays a vital role in the life of the school by supporting various initiatives and events as well as raising funds and approving expenditure for much needed additional resources and equipment that benefit all Their latest initiative was to our students. organise a second-hand sale of uniform items donated to the school during the last couple of years. KEEPING UP WITH PDHPE

FIRST AID WITH YEAR 12

Postponed in 2021, Year 12 were finally able to complete their First Aid Certificate with Surf Life Saving NSW. It was a highly informative event, with students practising CPR and learning about the correct procedures and management for injuries and medical conditions. This course complemented practical application for their current HSC PDHPE studies.



YEAR 11

Students are exploring how the body moves and why it moves in particular ways, focusing on the relationships between anatomy, physiology, fitness, biomechanics and efficient human movement.

They participated in an interactive activity where they investigated how the musculoskeletal and cardio respiratory systems of the body work together to respond to a specific sporting movement.

Year 7 started their PDHPE journey with a practical team challenges unit.

Students were encouraged to assess their own abilities and contribute back to the group whilst developing communication skills through participating in a range of activities. The highlight of the unit was the NHSPA Scavenger hunt where students completed a range of questions whilst exploring the school grounds.

SYDNEY ACADEMY OF SPORT

Our Year 12 students had the opportunity to attend Sydney's Academy Sport and Recreation Centre. The workshops were delivered by Sport Analysts and gave our students access to equipment and facilities to enhance their knowledge and understanding of the HSC PDHPE curriculum theory with practice. Students participated in hot and cold recovery pools, VO2 max testing and strength gym sessions.





The new Stage 5 elective has begun with a BANG! Students are enjoying a wide range of practical activities testing their physiological abilities as part of the Physical Fitness unit. At present, they are designing an individual training program for the school cross country to investigate how training programs are created. They will be monitoring their heart rates using our Polar heart sensors class set in addition to using the Strava app to track their training.

SNAPSHOTS FROM TAS

OZ HARVEST FEAST

This Year TAS has piloted a new Technology Mandatory unit in the Food and Agriculture strand, in partnership with Oz Harvest. This has been an exciting addition to our Technology Mandatory courses with six of our Year 7 students learning about food waste, food security and sustainability and how they can respond to these issues. This culminated in an expo with students promoting ways in which you can minimise food waste and utilise many good ingredients that so often end up in landfill.

YEAR 9 FOOD TECHNOLOGY

This term, students have been studying the evolution of Australian Cuisine beginning with First Nations people and the dietary changes that took place following the arrival of British settlers in 1788. Students have also researched how many Australian chefs are experimenting with fusion cuisine. DIGITAL TECHNOLOGY

Using the Edison Robots and creator kits Year 7 have been learning computer science, developing skills in writing computer programs and getting creative as budding future innovative inventors.






TEXTILES AND DESIGN

Works will be exhibited in the King Street Gallery on Thursday 23rd of June.








The *Places and Spaces* exhibition currently in the King Street Gallery showcases an incredible range of students' drawings featuring various locations, architecture and scenery.
