We are almost at the end of a very exciting but busy first term. There has been a lot that has happened over the last ten weeks, and we would like to proudly showcase and report on some of these events in this term's newsletter

2022 HIGHER SCHOOL CERTIFICATE RESULTS

Our students have achieved results with which we feel proud. Congratulations to the students, teachers and families whose achievements include:

- Students of Ancient History achieved an average 5.73 marks greater than the state mean, with 56.3% of students receiving band 5 or 6 (over 80 marks) compared to 26.5% statewide
- Biology students achieved an average 4.80 marks greater than the state mean with, 35.7% of students in Biology having achieved 80 or more, compared to 23.7% state-wide.
- Our Chemistry results were very strong, with an average 5.34 marks greater than the state mean with 45.5% of students receiving 80 or more, compared to 32.1% statewide
- In Dance, our students achieved 7.12 marks above state average, 42.3% received 90 plus compared to 18.9% statewide and 100% achieved in the top 2 bands compared to 51% state-wide
- Our Drama results were 4.22 marks above the state mean and 83.4% of students achieved a band 5 or 6, compared to 61.7% statewide.
- In English Standard, 62% of students achieved in the top two bands as compared to 45.6% statewide.
- Our Extension 1 English results saw 100% of students in the top 2 bands.
- Extension 2 English students achieved 4.17 marks above state average, with 100% of Extension 2 English students receiving marks in the top 2 bands compared to 83% statewide.
- With an average of 5.14 marks over the state, 53.9% of our Food Technology students achieved a mark of 80+, compared to 22.3% statewide
- Legal studies students achieved 2.84 over the state mean with 50% achieving a mark of over 80 compared to 31.9% statewide
- Our Mathematic Standard students achieved 4.80 over the state with 33.9% achieving results in the top 2 bands as compared to 19.7% statewide
- Our Mathematic Extension 1 students achieved 2.86 over the state, with 93.4% achieving results in the top 2 bands
- Music 1 results were again excellent this year, with students achieving 4.73 marks above state and an average of 50% achieved 90+ and 81.8% in the top 2 bands compared to 60% statewide
- In PDHPE, students achieved 4.23 marks above state average, 34.6% of student results in the top 2 bands compared to 20% statewide.
- In Physics, 50% of students achieved in the top 2 bands compared to 39.2% statewide.
- Textile & Design results showed 61.3% in the top 2 bands compared to 44.6% statewide.
- Visual Arts students achieved 4.21 above state, with an average of 31.8% achieving 90+ marks compared with 11.3% statewide, and 81.8% in the top 2 bands compared to 55.7% statewide.
- Finally, our Entertainment students scored 3.68 above state with 60.7% of students who sat the exam achieving 80+ marks compared to 36.5%.

This is just a small selection of achievers, and my congratulations go to all students who reached their own goals in the 2022 HSC. For our new senior students that journey is just beginning. The staff, while very happy with the results, will continue to analyse the 2022 results to continue to assist students to achieve their very best.

I am pleased to advise that Mr. Joseph Wong has been successful in his application for the permanent Mathematics teacher position at our school. Mr. Wong is an exceptional teacher who integrates evidence-informed pedagogy into his practice that both challenge and engages the learners in his classes. 
A step-by-step presentation outlining the process as well as documents required will be available to all year 10 students on Google Classroom and sent to parents/carers via email early Term 2.

dINNOVATIVE TEACHING AND LEARNING



At Newtown High School of the Performing Arts one of the ways we are working to shift the traditional paradigm in education is through explicitly teaching students about the dispositions that make an effective learner.

The Learning Disposition Wheel (LDW) allows teachers, students and our community to have a common language and shared understanding of the dispositions needed by students to maximise their learning.

The nine learning dispositions form the foundation for developing students our as lifelong learners. Students in all years can use the LDW to engage in deep learning and self-LDW reflection. The was designed by our academic partners Dr Miranda Jefferson and Prof. Michael Anderson from 4C Transformative Learning.

At Newtown we aim to develop our students' agency in their learning through initiatives such as Student Led Learning Conferences and e-Learning Portfolios. Each student in Stage 4 is creating their own e-Learning Portfolio in which they write learning goals, upload evidence of their learning and reflect on both what and how they learn in each of their courses. The language of the wheel is used in e-Learning Portfolio student reflections as well as in teacher feedback and report comments throughout the year.

Parents and carers are encouraged to ask their child for a tour of their e-Learning Portfolio at any stage during the year.

Another way we engage students is through **embodied learning** which aims to get students out of their seats and more physically involved in the process of learning. It is based on studies in neuroscience which indicate that connecting mind and body can allow for deeper learning.

At our recent in P&C Welcome BBQ our new parents engaged with enthusiasm in what we call a "donut"! Parents were up and moving in two concentric circles and involved in very animated discussions in pairs.

I look forward to sharing more information about the ways we are further developing a culture of deep learning and shifting the paradigm at Newtown in future newsletters.

Clearing the Smoke of the Climate Crisis By Meri Tinkler-Smith, Year 11

The bushfires of 2019-2020 killed 26 people, spanned over 5.5 million hectares, and destroyed 2400 homes. The environmental and financial losses caused by this disaster are still being felt three years on. In the same period, Australian coal, gas, and mining projects, all of which were approved by the Australian government, released 253 million tonnes of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere.

When the fire season began, I was thirteen years old, barely a year into high school and I spent the majority of my summer holidays hoping my house would still stand when I began year eight. Each night I'd look to the orange glow on the horizon, always closer than the night before. Each morning I'd wake to the sickly smell of smoke that descended upon us. Before breakfast I'd check the air quality rating to see if it was safe to go outside and I'd hope that each new billowing cloud creeping darkly over us would bring rain, but all that fell at my feet were ashes.

My family evacuated four times in eight weeks. We could only ever guess what we would return to. At thirteen years old, I feared for my home, for my pets and for my town.

Yet, I was lucky. While I escaped with fear and uncertainty, others lost their lives.

The 2019-2020 fires were driven to extreme intensities by changes in environmental factors. The year 2019 was Australia's driest year since 1900 and had a mean temperature of 1.52 degrees higher than previous years.

Troubling as these changes are, they aren't unexpected. The release of carbon dioxide into the atmosphere is the cause of 80% of global temperature increase. With a global emission rate of 37 billion metric tons per year, changes in global temperatures as a result of the increasing greenhouse gases in the atmosphere is anything but unexpected.

If current yearly emission rates are maintained, scientists have concluded that not only will the global temperature have risen more than 2 degrees by 2100, but major ecological consequences such as mass loss of habitat, increase in new diseases, drastic rise in sea level, and mass extinction events are likely to have occurred before the end of the century.

If the trajectory of fossil fuel production is maintained, the 2019-2020 bushfire crisis will become a common occurrence. Many more will not be as lucky as I was.

MATHS FACULTY

"Number is the within of all things" Pythagoras

It is a very busy end of term in Mathematics. Year 11 have completed their first task in the Standard, Advanced and Extension courses. And we wish our year 12 Maths students all the best in their upcoming exams. Remember to allow plenty of time to study, look at a wide variety of questions and strive through and persevere with the challenging questions.







Year 8 Maths students are currently researching Pythagoras' Theorem in Mathematics.

To satisfy the success criteria for this task, they require a combination of skills: good reading comprehension, dexterity, mathematical reasoning, and collaboration. The task is very hands on; the students need to work with drinking straws, pipe cleaners, and a A6 sheet of paper to discover what Pythagoras articulated some 3500 years ago.

Our students have demonstrated great communication skills and have worked cooperatively in pairs to present their conclusions.

The main event for Music for Term 1 has of course been the successful production and performances of Sweeney Todd, in which almost 100 students were involved in company, orchestra, crew, costuming, wigs and make up, props, ushering and administrative jobs. We are proud to be part of such a rich and active school population and community that embraces high quality arts projects so wholeheartedly.



Music Ensembles are underway for 2023, and it is wonderful that so many students are represented in Music. At last tally, 25% of students were involved in a Music Ensemble, which is a terrific embodiment of the importance of the arts in young people's lives.

A reminder that if you are absent for a rehearsal, communication with your ensemble director is expected. This will allow them to plan appropriately.

We cannot run the Ensembles program without the collection of fees in a timely manner. This goes principally towards tutor and director fees (of highquality educators), and towards sheet music purchases, library



upkeep, instrument hire and purchase, maintenance of instruments over time. Please check SchoolBytes for the permission and payment link. In Term 2, we will revise our ensemble lists and remove students who have not provided payment or who have not communicated a payment plan.

On Thursday the 9 of March, Year 12 Geography students dragged themselves out of bed and managed to meet in front of the school by 8am (well almost – a couple of stragglers rolling in around ten past), just in time to join Rafael, our very affable driver, as he escorted us to Avalon surf club on the stunning northern beaches of Sydney.

It was a magic morning, brilliant sunshine, very little breeze and a nice 2-to-3-foot swell producing some beautiful, clean little beach break waves. At this point I was just about ready to cancel the excursion on the spot and call an impromptu beach day, given how lovely the conditions were but alas there was schoolwork to be done and wetlands to be studied.

We were greeted at Avalon by Tim, our superknowledgeable and super-friendly expert for the day, to guide us through some of the finer details of the Careel Bay wetlands as part of our investigations into 'Ecosystems at Risk'. It was a very well-run excursion overall and great for the students to see firsthand, the impacts of human activity on such a delicately balanced environment.

Another valuable component was the access to a wide range of geographical equipment that the students used to record various data on wind, temperature, salinity, and light levels at a range of points throughout the wetlands. As in all good geography excursions the step-count was high by the end of our studies and the students had a wealth of new knowledge and primary evidence to bring back to the classroom and potentially incorporate into their latest assessment task.

The students were great throughout the day, doing the school proud as roving ambassadors! We look forward to our next excursion as a group, possibly a little further north next time...

Following the excursion, we were very fortunate to have Diyan Coe, a First Nation's artist and elder, provide workshops for students, introducing them to a variety of native plants and their significance to First Nation's peoples. It was enlightening to hear this perspective firsthand.





The seniors have begun the year with enthusiasm and are preparing for the first round of assessments for the year.

Chemistry students have been completing titrations, motors are being built in Physics and genetic family histories being constructed in Biology. There's never a dull moment in Science.





Year 7 have been finding out all about the laboratory, learning about the myriad of equipment and learning how to use the Bunsen burner.

This is always a highlight for Year 7 – it is not often they are allowed to play with fire. Learning about the types of observations we make in Science has also allowed them to participate in their first science experiments, observing chemical reactions, such as the mysterious blue bottle that changes colour, sugar that turns into a column of black rising foam and chemicals that go cold when mixed.

DESIGNS AND FOOD SNAPSHOTS FROM TAS

As we begin 2023, we are excited to continue to provide our students with the latest technology tools and resources that will enhance their learning experiences. Our goal is to equip our students with the skills and knowledge necessary to succeed in a rapidly changing technological landscape.



Year 12 Food Technology

Year 12 have been learning about Food Preservation and Food Product Development and are developing a 12-month shelf stable food. Students learn about product design, sensory analysis, and consumer preferences. Students are developing marketing presentation to pitch their product to a potential company. Last week was the testing of the protypes, the products look and taste amazing.



Year 11 Design & Technology

Year 11 have been developing design concepts and construction techniques to produce a toy for a specific age between 5 to 12 years of age. The toy must be age appropriate and address correct safety requirements and standards. Students have been exploring a diverse range of materials and innovative approaches to design and the final product.



Year 10 Design & Technology

Students have been working with Aluminium sheet to design and produce a wearable piece or a key tag. They have explored a variety of design ideas that meet the target audience for their project.

Students have learnt the fundamentals of jewellery making using specific tools and equipment to saw, file and sand their designs in preparation for a highly polished surface.



This term Year 10 have been creating recipes that could be incorporated into the Marley Spoon Recipe repertoire.

These recipes have been developed and a thorough cost analysis has been done to ensure their viability. Recipes were then cooked and styled for recipe cards.

Year 10 Textiles & Design

Year 10 Textiles have been working on fabric manipulation and embellishment techniques. These techniques will then be used to decorate a bucket hat that they will make.





Students from the Year 8 Master Chef class prepared the traditional recipe of Spaghetti Bolognese. They work in teams to collaborate in preparing the ingredients and carefully follow the recipe to achieve and master the true essence of a meal. In addition, emphasizing the importance of food hygiene and safety, which are essential aspects of food technology education.

Year 8 Mandatory Technology

Students have been learning about nutrition this term. This is essential knowledge as it allows students to develop the skills to make informed decisions about their diet and lifestyle. Students have learnt the benefits of healthy eating and risks associated with poor nutrition



Year 7 Mandatory Technology Textiles

Learning Cross Stitch helps promote focus, patience, and concentration. Year 7 have embraced this new activity with open arms to start the year.

Year 7 Mandatory Technology Woodwork The students have been making and decorating a boom box in woodwork. They have been learning about design and construction. The boom box encourages creativity, allowing students to create unique designs that reflect their personal style.


